
Canals and Railroads

The first canal in Pennsylvania was finished in May 1825. The Schuylkill Canal was 108 miles long and connected the coal fields near Pottsville to Philadelphia. This was the beginning of the canal building era. The canals had to be near rivers and this limited their use for transportation. By 1833 a train called "Old Ironsides" ran between Philadelphia and Norristown, and this started the great railroad building era.
